# Religious Education

# English

- English is taught using Explicit instruction. This involves directing student attention toward specific learning in a structured environment. It is **teaching** that is focused on producing specific learning outcomes. Topics are broken down into small parts and taught individually.
- Reading – Literacy Pro – levelled books and quizzes. Independent reading
- English Stars - English programme in Year 4-6. English Stars is built around a yearly plan that aligns with the Australian Curriculum for English. Includes comprehension, spelling, grammar, writing and assessment.

# Maths

Taught using Explicit instruction.

# Health – Keeping Safe

School-wide Health curriculum.

Key focus for each term. Term 1 focus is 'The Right to be Safe'

This focus is broken into three topics:

- Warning Signs
- Risk-taking and Emergencies
- Psychological pressures and manipulation

# HASS

Term 1 Focus: Civics and Citizenship

Students will study the key figures, events and ideas that led to Australia's Federation and constitution.

# Music

Students will continue to learn the recorder and ukulele. Pitch and rhythm will continue to be covered. This will include time signatures in 6/8. Students will learn more chords on the ukulele and more songs. Students will also do a listening assignment on a choice of their favourite songs. They will need to write about 3 songs and then briefly describe five other songs.



# Sport

Children will need to link fundamental movement skills to specific skills used in organised games, sports and activities such as linking kicking to passing and shooting in soccer. They will usually be able to accurately catch and throw a variety of passes, under some pressure over short to medium distance, while stationary and on the move. Use a variety of movements and changes of direction to make an effective play. They will need to have special awareness and lead into appropriate space to receive a pass. Children transition between offence and defense and usually chooses effective options and provides some non-verbal and verbal communication to attract attention to receive a pass.

# Science

Children will be learning how the growth and survival of living things are affected by the physical conditions of their environment. They will investigate the growth of bread mould in different conditions and set up an experiment to find out how the physical conditions for plants can impact their growth and survival. Children will learn about the physical conditions that cause migration and hibernation.

# Italian

- Italian second language builds on the skills, knowledge and understanding of the language of developed in previous years and focuses on extending their oral and written communication skills and their understandings of Italian language and culture.
- Students continue to understand and respond to teacher instructions. They communicate in Italian to exchange information and relate experiences about sports and pastimes. They are noticing adjective-noun agreement, expressing positive and negative preferences, using adverbs for effect, can express negation, formulate questions and requests, use plural subject pronouns and regular and irregular verbs in simple spoken and written texts. They will translate and interpret short texts from Italian to English and vice versa and will apply knowledge of these grammatical elements into letters/emails to Italian pen pals.
- They will be presented with information about famous Italian people, monuments or landmarks and will be required to choose one to research in detail and complete a profile of same.

# Homework

- Homework should be relevant, and the tasks to be accomplished carefully and clearly defined for the students.
- Homework in Year Six aims to prepare students for some of the demands of high school, encouraging them to be organised and responsible for completing and handing their work in on time.
- Teachers need to be aware of family commitments that may prevent children from completing their homework on occasions. Homework should not be used as a punishment.
- Homework will run Monday to Friday (due Friday).

## **ONENOTE/SEESAW**

OneNote is where the students will find all of their content for the year, that is updated on a regular basis. There are individual sections where they can work/view as a whole class, collaborate with each other and work individually, where only they see what is being produced.

Information in regards to assignments including marking guides i.e. rubrics and checklists, will be explained prior to the task, and available for them to refer back to and. Children will have access to this at home via internet. However, no internet connection will not be accepted as an excuse for not completing their homework or assignments as they can take screen shots before leaving the classroom.

Seesaw is their digital portfolio which you are all familiar with. This is where we will upload all of their assignments, exciting things they have done in class and important information and updates.



## Mornings and after school

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- Upon arriving at school students are asked to sit or stand in front of the library with hat on.
- Bell goes at 8:20am – class doors open. Students are to come in, greet their teachers and classmates, complete a LCWC and go on with any unfinished work. We begin our lessons at 8:25am every morning.
- We will have an expectation that the Year 6's will come in and organise themselves and be 'ready to learn' each morning.
- After school – move to pick up area promptly. Sit with their younger siblings in designated area. Students walking to Irene McCormack will be walked over by a staff member.



## Mornings and after school cont.

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- If your child has been dropped to school after 8:35am, they must be signed in at the office by a parent/guardian before coming to class.



# Behaviour Management

- Positive behaviours will be recognised and encouraged.
- Positive decisions, good behaviour and work ethic rewarded through earning points. Both classes have 'Class Dojo' system. Students receive points for good behaviour and earn rewards
- The St Francis of Assisi CPS Behaviour Management Plan is designed to minimise interruptions from inappropriate behaviour in order to maximise the teaching and learning process. The Behaviour Plan also acts as a pathway, in conjunction with parents, to guide our students to become active, responsible, considerate, giving members of the community.
- A warning system applies in our classrooms. 3 warnings, time out and reflection in partner room or wet area.


- A note or email is required to explain absences. Notes must be dated and signed by a legal guardian.
